3/16/2020	<p>2020-10: Temporary expansion in unemployment eligibility and cost sharing</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Effective through April 14, strict compliance with the Michigan Employment Security Act is suspended • Workers who leave work for medical reasons including self-isolation or self-quarantine in response to elevated risk, displaying symptoms of COVID, or contact with positive COVID in past 14 days, need to care for someone with confirmed COVID will be considered an involuntary leave • Persons must be deemed as laid off if they become unemployed for any of the above reason • Persons meeting the above criteria must be considered to be unemployed, unless the person is already on sick leave or receives a disability benefit. • Persons meeting the above criteria and who files a claim for unemployment benefits within 28 days of the last day of work must be considered to have filed on time • For individuals filing an initial claim until April 14, not more than 26 weeks of benefits are payable to an individual in a benefit year. • The unemployment insurance agency may approve a shared work plan, regardless of employer’s reserves. • An employer must not be charged for unemployment benefits if their employees become unemployed because of an executive order requiring them to close or limit operations 	Rescinded

Exceptions: healthcare facilities, workplaces or portions not open to the public, the state legislature, assemblages for mass transit, purchases of groceries or consumer goods, performance of agricultural or construction work • All K-12 school buildings will close includes public, nonpublic, and boarding schools. A temporary registration will be valid for 28 days and may be renewed until termination of the state of emergency. • LARA may renew a license to practice regardless of meeting the continuing education requirements • LARA may recognize hours worked responding to the COVID emergency as hours toward continuing education • LARA may allow a non-nursing assistant, such as an activity coordinator, social worker, or volunteer to assist in feeding or transporting (not transferring) a patient in alignment with the resident care plan.
