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**Is Hunger an Issue ?**

- Nearly 40% of children in Minnesota qualify for free/reduced meals
  - *Many schools have over 50% of children qualifying for free/reduced meals.*
- 20% of children in Minnesota live with food insecurity.
- Nearly all communities have pockets of poverty.
- For many students, school meals are their primary source of nutrition.

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**CACFP At-Risk Afterschool Meals Program**



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## At-Risk Afterschool Meals Program

- A component of the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)
- Offers monetary reimbursement to sites that serve nutritious meals/snacks as part of an afterschool program
- Provides funds for meals/snacks so afterschool program resources can be used on other activities

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## School Benefits



- ▶ Dependable federal funding.
- ▶ No need to collect individual eligibility information.
- ▶ Flexibility in scheduling the time and sequence of meals.
- ▶ Highest reimbursement rates. All students eat for free.
- ▶ Increased revenue to your food service program
- ▶ Streamlined application.
- ▶ If determined area eligible, eligibility is good for five years.

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## Participant Benefits

- ▶ More interest in activities
- ▶ Better behavior
- ▶ Supports health and development
- ▶ Better focus and performance
- ▶ Kids get the fuel they need to learn, play and grow!



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## Benefits of Supper

**Benefits of Supper versus Snack**

- ▶ Serving all 5 meal components gives students more food (Snack are 2 of 5 components)
- ▶ Results in larger reimbursement and program feasibility

**Benefits of service immediately after school**

- ▶ Maximum number of students served
- ▶ Youth are hungry and may be staying late at school for activities
- ▶ May be last meal for some students until next day
- ▶ Extension of work day for staff

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## Sponsor Eligibility

Eligible organizations include

- Public agencies such as schools or city governments
- Tax-exempt nonprofit organizations
- For-profit centers
- Those currently participating in another Federal program requiring nonprofit status [7 CFR 226.17a(a)(iv)]


This list of public schools, school classifications 10-14, contains data from the Minnesota Automated Reporting Student System (MARSS), including enrollment (pre-K through grade 12), number of students approved for free and reduced-price school meals and percent of free/reduced-price eligible students. The percent of free/reduced-price eligible students is used to determine eligibility for the summer meal programs (Summer Food Service Program and Section 8 Summer Program), the After-school Snack Program and the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP). One worksheet contains a complete list of all schools and the remaining worksheets (see table at bottom of page) show the "Highgate" schools, percent of free/reduced-price eligible students, and the number of students approved for free and reduced-price school meals. The "Highgate" schools are schools that have been approved to offer programs to eligible students in order to participate in a free/reduced-price school meal program. After-school Snack and Summer Meal Programs are open to all students. Other schools on this list must renew annually and the summer meal sites and CACFP Snack sites are reviewed bi-annually for the years. Note: Schools that have fewer than 50 percent free/reduced-price eligible students may be eligible for Summer Meal Programs based on other data, which is not part of this report.

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

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## Child Nutrition Program Eligibility Map



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## Program Eligibility

### Program Eligibility



Primarily to provide care during the regular school year

- after school or snow days
- on weekends, holidays or school vacations.



Must collect attendance, but may be enrolled or drop in.

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### Programs and Activities



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### Sports Teams

Students who are part of school sports teams can receive meals/snacks as part of an overarching educational or enrichment program, but the program cannot be limited to a sports team.



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### Participant Eligibility




- ▶ Children through age 18 at beginning of school year.
- ▶ No *minimum* age limit.
- ▶ No age limit for students with disabilities.
- ▶ Programs are allowed to set age minimums or maximums.

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### Meal Service

- Provides reimbursement for **1 snack** and **1 meal** per participant per day
- No charge for meals/snacks
- After the regular school day\*
- On school breaks, holidays and weekends during the regular school year

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### Meal Times

- School days: After the bell. Meal times are flexible.
- May serve “Supper” or “Super Snack” immediately after school and snack later.
- Non-school days: Snack/meal may be served at any time of the day.
- There are no time limit requirements between meal services.

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**SY18-19 CACFP At-Risk Reimbursement**

- At-Risk Snack: **\$.91**
- At-Risk Breakfast: **\$1.79**
- At-Risk Lunch / Supper: **\$3.31 + \$.235 (CIL) = \$3.545**
- **CIL Cash-in-lieu of commodities** is paid for each lunch and supper



\*An additional 23.5 cents for cash-in-lieu of commodities is paid for each lunch and supper.

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**CACFP At-Risk Revenue Example**



- Site offers afternoon snack and supper to participants for 20 days during a month
- Site serves a total of 864 reimbursable snacks and 978 reimbursable suppers.

Snacks: 864 x \$0.91 =	\$786.24
Suppers: 978 x \$3.545 =	\$3,467.01
Total Reimbursement =	\$4,253.25

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## Summer Food Service Program (SFSP)

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## Summer Food Service Program

- Programs that wish to continue operating when school is not in session may be eligible to receive reimbursement for meals and snacks through the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP).
- Schools that operate year-round may receive reimbursement for meals and snacks through the CACFP all year.

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## Summer Food Service Program Qualifying Program Criteria

## Like At-Risk

- Available to children and youth through age 18 and over 18 with a disability.
- Eligibility based on school data where at least 50% of students are eligible for free or reduced meals.
- Require educational or enrichment activities and attendance records.
- Not required to provide organized, regularly scheduled, age-appropriate activities.
- Site eligibility may qualify site using other data, including census data.
- Do not require educational or enrichment activities and attendance records.

## Unlike At-Risk

- Not required to provide organized, regularly scheduled, age-appropriate activities.
- Site eligibility may qualify site using other data, including census data.
- Do not require educational or enrichment activities and attendance records.



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

- Claim up to 2 meals per day
- Any combination of two meals may be claimed except lunch and supper

**Eligible for 5 Years!**

**Summer school/credit recovery programs and Area Learning programs must qualify site to participate in SFSP or stay on the NSLP/SBP.**

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### Closed Enrolled Sites



All children eat free when at least 50% of **children enrolled** are income eligible.

OR

- Site is located in eligible area.
- Eligibility must be redetermined annually.
- May claim up to two meals a day.
- **NOT allowed for summer schools.**



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**Summer Food Service Program Waivers**

The USDA Office of Inspector General recently found that USDA provided waivers from SFSP requirements on a national level, which according to law may be waived only upon request from a state agency. The affected SFSP waivers were canceled effective October 11, 2018. MDE submitted our request for the USDA to re-issue waivers for the four SFSP requirements before the federal shutdown. Waiver request details found at [Public Notice posted in the Minnesota State Register](#) (p. 735 in print; p. 28 in the PDF).

MDE will request that the following SFSP requirements be waived for Minnesota:

- The requirement that *only* school food authorities may use Offer vs. Serve (OVS) in SFSP.
- The requirement that school meal pattern rules must be followed when using OVS.
- The requirement that *all* SFSP sites receive first-week site visits. SFSP sites that operated the program successfully in the previous summer and have no serious deficiency findings would be exempt from this requirement.
- The regulatory limitations on meal service times. Flexibilities would be allowed.
- The requirement that *all* closed enrolled sites, even if located in an eligible area, must qualify for SFSP based on the income eligibility of children attending the site.
