
Spotlight on MLA History

OUT OF THE MOLD--Here are a couple of examples of librarians who did not fit the librarian stereotype.

Getting the public to use libraries has always been a challenge. In a rather innovative move, in 1938, MLA set up a radio show to get some much needed PR. The radio broadcast, called "Fact Finders", aired on KSTP from Oct. 5,1938-June 30, 1939, and featured a radio announcer and a librarian. Lee F. Zimmerman, the State Director of Libraries, sent a letter out to librarians in Minnesota explaining to them that scripts from the shows were available

to them or a member of their staff that they thought might be qualified. The <u>letter's text</u> was found on Minnesota Reflections.

These radio shows aired as a way to get the public to understand that libraries were more than reading rooms or shelves of books. If the librarians could find airtime on the local radio station, the scripts were available at no charge. The public was asked to send in questions they wanted answered, and the shows included at least two minutes of music of the fifteen minutes allotted. The radio announcer would query the librarian, and he or she would give the answer to the question as well as the source of the information. The questions covered everything from the climate in South Africa to finding an article in LADIES' HOME JOURNAL about hosting a Turkish dinner with recipes. The program aired for about a year. And here is the script from the very first Fact Finders, aired on KSTP radio. These shows were, perhaps, an early form of public service announcement.



Librarians are very creative and occasionally "musicals" would be part of the MLA conferences. The 90th Annual Conference held on April 16-18, 1986 showcased INFORAMA! (a takeoff on OKLAHOMA!). It was a great hit!

INFORAMA! featured such catchy tunes as the ever famous "Oh, What a Beautiful Library",

"the circ is as high as an elephant's heart, and it looks like it's climbin' clear off the chart"

and "The Bookbus with the Fringe On Top",

"Chicks and ducks and geese gonna cuss When I take you out on the bus When i take you out on the bookbus with the fringe on top."
