AMA and CMS Announce "Grace Period" Details to Ease ICD-10 Transition

CMS Will be Flexible on ICD-10 Specificity for One Year After the October 1 Deadline

With less than three months remaining until the nation switches from ICD-9 to ICD-10 coding on October 1, 2015, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) and the American Medical Association (AMA) announced efforts to help physicians as they continue to get ready for the transition. In response to requests from the provider community, including the Medical Society of DC, CMS released guidance that will allow for flexibility in the claims auditing and quality reporting process as the medical community gains experience using the new ICD- 10 code set. Modifications issued in the CMS guidance include:

- For a one year period starting October 1, Medicare claims will not be denied solely on the specificity of the ICD-10 diagnosis codes provided, as long as the physician submitted an ICD-10 code from an appropriate family of codes. In addition, Medicare claims will not be audited based on the specificity of the diagnosis codes as long as they are from the appropriate family of codes. This policy will be followed by Medicare Administrative Contractors and Recovery Audit Contractors.
- To avoid potential problems with mid-year coding changes in CMS quality programs (PQRS, VBM and MU) for the 2015 reporting year, physicians using the appropriate family of diagnosis codes will not be penalized if CMS experiences difficulties in accurately calculating quality scores.
- CMS will authorize advanced payments if Medicare contractors are unable to process claims within established time limits due to problems with ICD-10 implementation.
- CMS will establish an ICD-10 Ombudsman to help receive and triage physician and provider problems

The Medicare claims processing systems will not have the capability to accept ICD-9 codes for dates of services after September 30, 2015, nor will they be able to accept claims for both ICD-9 and ICD-10 codes.

ICD-10 Deadline Is Still October 1, 2015 - Less Than 90 Days Away

The October 1 deadline for implementation of the ICD-10 code set is fast approaching, and time is running out for physician practices to complete their preparation. MSDC Lobbies DC Council Vigorously In Final Weeks Before Summer Recess MSDC Board Voices Physician Concerns on District Healthcare Legislation

The Medical Society continues to push the DC Council to act on important healthcare legislation before the Council breaks for summer recess at the end of the month. Last month, the Medical Society Board of Directors reviewed a growing list of healthcare bills before the DC Council and weighed their impact on District physicians and their patients. The Medical Society Board moved to support B21-171, the "Healthcare Decisions Act of 2015," which creates a Medical Orders for Scopes of Treatment Form to document patients' wishes for medical intervention. The Medical Society submitted a letter of support for the public record.

Telemedicine Benefits and Risks

The healthcare landscape has changed radically in recent years. Implementation of the Affordable Care Act, expanding roles for nurse practitioners and physician assistants, meaningful use, and ICD-10 preparation are just the highlights.
