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2009 Charitable Bingo Gross Receipts Highest Ever

(Austin) — Calendar year 2009 has proven to be the highest-grossing ever for charitable bingo since the game was legalized in 1981, with total receipts surpassing \$693 million and players winning a record \$518 million in prizes.

“With total receipts of \$693 million, an \$8 million increase over last year, charitable organizations were better able to provide services to their constituencies,” said Texas Lottery Commission Director of Charitable Bingo, Philip Sanderson. “Charitable distributions also increased for the sixth consecutive year, as organizations reported they distributed \$36 million for their charitable purposes. Total distributions since 1981 now exceed \$937 million.”

The following chart shows a comparison of activity in charitable bingo during the last two calendar years:

“Since 1981, nearly 647 million persons have attended bingo occasions,” Sanderson said. “The numbers speak for themselves, proving that charitable bingo continues to be a popular pastime for many Texans.” There were 1,255 non-profits that conducted charitable bingo games during 2009.

Gaming Standards Association Creates Game Authentication Committee to Develop an EGM Validation Protocol

Committee Will Work to Alleviate Software Verification Issues

In today's gaming industry, there are three software concerns at the gaming device level. First, there is not an accepted standard for validating machine software at the machine; second, multiple versions of the game authentication terminal are being used for verification; and third, there is not a common or recommended method for validating files on high capacity storage media. To help operators, regulators and suppliers resolve this situation, the Gaming Standards Association has created the Game Authentication Terminal (GAT) Committee.

Comprised of GSA members from around the world, the newly formed committee will work to formalize a common GAT protocol interface for use in verifying the software on a gaming device by physically connecting to the gaming device. The committee will also define a common method of validating software from high capacity storage devices, such as CD-ROM, DVD, hard drive and disk-on-chip.

GSA President Peter DeRaedt said, "The lack of standardization in this area is a concern because it complicates a very important process and adds undue costs for everyone involved. As is the case with all of GSA's standards committees, the work that comes out of GAT will benefit the entire industry by solving a problem, reducing costs and creating a standard that will be globally acceptable."

BC Horse Racing Revitalization Initiative

Horse racing in British Columbia, as in other jurisdictions across North America, is in difficulty and decline. The BC government recognizes the value and benefit derived from horse racing, both for the industry itself and for the broader economy (e.g.: agriculture and tourism) and has, over time, undertaken several initiatives to help to improve it. Unfortunately, the industry has been unable to turn around declining revenues or resolve inherent problems themselves and has turned to the government for assistance.

The government's response has been the establishment of the "BC Horse Racing Industry Revitalization Initiative" in Spring 2009. The scope of this initiative encompasses nothing less than the restructuring of an entire industry and the development of an entirely new financial model, management structure and accountability process. While government has taken the lead in this initiative, it has done so at the request and with the cooperation of the diverse elements of the industry.

What is unique with this initiative is that the government, which is responsible for regulating the industry, is directly involved in leading and facilitating change within the management of it. What is also different is that the deliverable for this initiative is not a report with recommendations for further consideration, but rather progressive, effective and expeditious change to the management of the industry.

The initiative, partnership and approach are innovative and, since the initiative commenced, real change has been implemented in the management of horse racing in BC:

- In August 2009, an entirely new, simplified, transparent and accountable financial model was established, which consolidates the management of industry revenues under the control of a new industry management committee.
- In October 2009, a new Horse Racing Industry Marketing Plan was developed, with the assistance of the BC Lottery Corporation, which is intended to grow the attendance and revenues of horse racing in BC.
- In November 2009, the new BC Horse Racing Industry Management Committee was created to provide strategic direction, decisions and business leadership to the horse racing industry in BC. Horse racing operators, associations and participants will continue to make operational decisions consistent with their mandated responsibilities, but they are to do so within the broad business and fiscal framework established by the Committee. The regulation of horse racing events in BC remains the responsibility of the provincial government.
- In February 2010, the Management Committee, having undertaken an in-depth analysis of industry finances, met with key industry organizations to discuss the industry's current financial circumstances and allocations for 2010. A longer term strategy was outlined, including mid to long term options to grow the industry.
- A new Performance Management (Measurement) process will be developed and incorporated into the new industry management and financial model which will measure performance against targets to understand progress and completion of industry business objectives.

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While significant progress has been achieved, much remains to be done, and while success is not yet guaranteed, it is evident that the changes implemented to date improve the industry's chances of turning itself around.

With all of its challenges, however, the strength of the initiative is the willingness of all parties to come together in a new partnership with each other and with government to meet a common objective. ■

New Indiana Law Requires Casinos to Withhold Child Support Obligations

The 117th session of the Indiana General Assembly adjourned sine die on March 13, 2010, with the legislature having passed none of the headline-grabbing casino laws that surfaced during the session. Despite the legislature having convened a study committee over the summer of 2009 that examined high-profile issues such as land-based gaming, relief from maritime requirements, tax breaks for Indiana's two racinos, a new casino in Gary, and a Fort Wayne casino, none of those topics found a home in an enrolled act of the legislature. The General Assembly did pass some lower-profile language that will have an immediate impact on the gaming business in Indiana. I will examine Senate Enrolled Act 163, which contains, among other things, a requirement that casinos withhold winnings from deadbeat parents and send the winnings to the state child services department.

Senate Enrolled Act 163, effective July 1, 2010, adds a new enforcement mechanism for capturing past due child support from delinquent obligors. A child support obligor is considered to be "delinquent" under Indiana law if the obligor is at least \$2,000 or three months behind on court-ordered child support payments (IC 4-33-2-5.8). SEA 163 requires casinos to withhold and transmit to the Department of Child Services ("Child Services") a delinquent obligor's

casino winnings in an amount up to the delinquent obligation, as long as the obligor's winnings surpass the \$1,200 tax reporting threshold. Indiana casinos will be able to identify obligors because Child Services is required to provide the casinos with information about delinquent obligors [IC 4-33-4-27(a)]. The law is silent as to how much information Child Services will provide and does not establish a procedure for a casino to obtain additional information that may be needed for enforcement purposes. The Indiana Gaming Commission may need to pass regulations regarding the exchange of information if SEA 163's silence on this topic hinders enforcement.

In an acknowledgment of the administrative cost of identifying, tracking, and withholding winnings from a delinquent obligor, the casino may take an administrative fee in the amount of three percent of the delinquent child support, or \$100, whichever is less [IC 4-33-4-27(b)(1)]. Under the new law, if a patron with \$2,500 in unpaid child support wins a \$5,500 jackpot, the casino must first withhold state and federal tax obligations, and then submit the \$2,500 delinquency to Child Services before it may retain its three percent fee (\$75). Only then can the casino pay

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the patron any remaining winnings and/or pay any other secured or unsecured claim on the winnings [IC 4-33-4-27(e)].

SEA 163 gives casinos protection in the form of limitation of liability clauses that: 1) recognize the possibility that a casino will accidentally pay a delinquent obligor's winnings to the obligor; and 2) address casino liability for complying with the new law. Indiana Code 4-33-8.5-4(b) states that a casino that pays winnings instead of withholding them is not liable to the "person to whom the obligor owes child support." Indiana Code 4-33-8.5-4(c) provides statutory civil and criminal immunity to a casino that complies with the new law. These protections come at a price; the Gaming Commission has the authority to penalize a casino that fails to withhold child support obligations in accordance with the prescribed procedure [IC 4-33-8.5-5(a)].

Casino Association of Indiana CEO Mike Smith offered some opposition to the bill during the legislative session by asking the legislature not to pass off a government responsibility (collection of child support) to a private business, and by arguing that the new requirement would impose an unfair burden on casino staff. He did not find many sympathetic ears, as the bill passed out of committees by a combined vote of 20-1 and passed both the House and Senate by similar margins. Smith did succeed in getting the assembly to increase the casino administrative fee to \$100 or three percent of the obligation; an earlier version of the bill capped that fee at \$15.

When the 118th General Assembly convenes, major casino issues will grab headlines once again. Until then, SEA 163 represents the extent of current legislative drama for Indiana's casinos. ■
