We are very much defined by our work. Drop into any gathering and eventually someone will ask, "So, what do you do?" I always answer emphatically, "I'm a bookseller, and if you are interested in occupations, do I have some recommendations for you!"

In celebration of LABOR DAY, here's a list of some of my favorites. Gather them together in workmanlike fashion and create a nifty end-cap, window, or table display. Don't forget to dress up your display with some blank applications, W-2 forms, a variety of tools, maybe a hard hat, the employment ads from the newspaper, and a few images of laborers downloaded from the internet.

- WORKING by Studs Terkel The classic work within which men and women representing a variety of occupations describe their daily routines.
- FIREFIGHTERS by Dennis Smith An unforgettable journey through the daily lives of the brave men and women who have made saving lives their profession.
- RIVETHEAD by Ben Hamper An irreverent look inside the world of American auto workers and life on and off the assembly line for blue-collar America.
- LIFE ON THE LEDGE by Ivor Hanson A tale of risk, punk music, voyeurism, identity, and clean windows.
- SHELF LIFE by Suzanne Strempek Shea Romance, mystery, drama, and other page-turning adventures from a year's employment in a bookstore.
- DISHWASHER by Pete Jordan One man's quest to wash dishes in all 50 states.

- DON'T TELL MOM I WORK ON THE RIGS (SHE THINKS I'M A PIANO PLAYER IN A WHOREHOUSE) by Paul Carter - One man's wild adventures in the oil trade and the business of drilling for black gold on an offshore platform.
- ANOTHER DAY IN THE FRONTAL LOBE by Katrina Firlik An engaging tour of human brains and the doctors who cut into them.
- THE WORKING POOR: INVISIBLE IN AMERICA by David K. Shipler This
 volume, a finalist for the National Book Critics Circle Award, provides an intimate
 portrait of ethnically diverse, poverty-level, working families and the legacy of
 problems inherent to their condition.
- WAITING by Debra Ginsberg A veteran waitress dishes up a spicy and robust account of life as it really exists behind kitchen doors.
- WORKING ON THE EDGE by Spike Walker A harrowing account of survival in the world's most dangerous profession King Crab fishing on Alaska's high seas.
- HACK by Melissa Plaut This entertaining memoir describes the author's two years behind the wheel of a yellow cab on the streets of Manhattan.
- NEWJACK by Ted Conover The author, a former guard at the Sing Sing prison, looks back on his rookie year employed at the correctional facility.
- YOU'LL NEVER NANNY IN THIS TOWN AGAIN by Suzanne Hansen The true adventures of a Hollywood nanny.
- CANDY GIRL by Diablo Cody A year in the life of an unlikely stripper.
- THE ESCAPE ARTISTS by Joshua Piven True stories of people who turned their obsessions into professions.
- HERE IF YOU NEED ME by Kate Braestrup This beautifully written volume chronicles the work of the author, a Unitarian Universalist minister, serving as chaplain for the Maine Warden Service.

A more industrious soul would go on to recommend additional books about occupations in science, education, business, health care, and more. But I'm not that industrious. May I suggest that you roll up your own sleeves and get busy on a display? Competent workers will, no doubt, also include some volumes on resume writing, cover letters, interviews, the job search, and career opportunities in their display. Work! Work! Work!
