<u>Brief Description:</u> This bill is about children who are conceived by sexual assault and whose biological fathers have been convicted of that sexual assault. There are three primary things this bill would do:

- 1. The county attorney will file a TPR on the bio father, and the conviction would be enough evidence for the TPR, unless the child's bio mother or guardian consents otherwise and the court finds that the TPR isn't in the child's best interest.
- 2. If there is a pending criminal investigation, the court will pause paternity action. If the bio father is found not guilty, the action will proceed. If the bio father is found guilty, that conviction will establish paternity and the TPR will proceed.
- 3. If the child is removed from his/her mother/guardian, reasonable efforts to preserve and reunify the family wouldn't apply to the bio father.

The bill also requires that the mother or guardian must consent in order for the court to determine that a person required to be registered as a sex offender (for an offense that makes their access to a child questionable) be granted custody,

unsupervised parenting time, visitation, or other access to a child. (Current statute simply states that the court must find there is no significant risk to the child.)

- If the Nebraska Legislature passes Wellness in Nebraska, it is estimated:
 - o 500 Nebraska lives will be saved annually.
 - About 54,000 uninsured Nebraskans will get health insurance and "newly enroll" in Medicaid,
 - Nebraska will see close to \$2 billion returned to our state from the federal government by 2020 to pay for Wellness in Nebraska.
- Wellness in Nebraska: A Win for Employers, Taxpayers, and the Uninsured
 - Save lives and improve the physical and mental health of Nebraska citizens. Research has demonstrated that regular access to health care treatment and services keeps people healthier. A healthier child becomes a healthier adult. A healthier adult is less likely to develop a serious, and expensive, medical issue
 - Save rural hospitals that may <u>be put at risk due to financial strain</u> if Wellness in Nebraska is not passed in the 2104 legislative session.

The purpose of the Criminal Justice Reentry and Data Act is to build upon the history of the Community Corrections Act enacted in 2003, with the goal of increasing public safety.

The Community Corrections Act provided for the development and establishment of community-based facilities and programs in Nebraska for adult offenders. The resulting increase in Nebraska's prison population and corrections costs necessitate a new approach to managing those who violate the criminal laws of our state.

The Criminal Justice Reentry and Data Act changes the approach to Nebraska's criminal justice system from a focus on incapacitation to a focus on offender transition and reentry. The Reentry Programming Board is created.

Members of the board shall include:

- (a) A behavioral health provider;
- (b) A mental health provider;
- (c) A substance abuse treatment provider;
- (d) A community reentry organization;
- (e) A formerly incarcerated person who has had successful reentry;
- (f) A criminal justice research expert;
- (g) A prosecutor;
- (h) A retired district court judge;
- A law enforcement officer;
- j) The Director of Correctional Services or his or her designee;
- (k) The chairperson of the Board of Parole or his or her designee; and
- (I) A representative from the Office of Probation

The board shall:

- (1) Evaluate programming available to inmates, probationers, and parolees, to ensure that programs are evidence based and develop other criteria for ensuring programming is effective;
- (2) Coordinate with Department of Correctional Services, the Office of Parole Administration, and the Office of Probation Administration to track inmate, probationer, and parolee participation in programming:
- (3) Evaluate access to nongovernmental programming;
- (4) Track reentering offenders' participation in programming;

Coordinate with nongovernmental providers and organizations for more nongovernmental provider programming, including contracts with community-based providers, including the University of Nebraska Medical Center, nonprofits, and private providers, for more programming in the areas of mental health, behavioral health, and substance abuse treatment, and coordinating with community-based organizations;

- (6) Conduct independent evaluations of (a) the Department of Correctional Services programming and access to programming within such department and (b) other prison, probation, or parole mandated or recommended programming;
- (7) Coordinate with nongovernmental researchers to conduct independent evaluation of the classification system;
- (8) Advocate for removal of barriers to offender reentry and work with governmental agencies and nongovernmental entities to remove restrictions on funding for services to formerly incarcerated people in the areas of housing, job skills training, hiring restrictions, education, and child custody;
- (9) Develop a plan for transitioning from a community corrections model to a reentry model;
- (10) Develop standards for the use of reentry facilities and programs by the Department of Corrections, the Nebraska Probation System, and the parole system;
- (11) Analyze and promote the consistent use of offender risk assessment tools; Inform the courts, the Board of Parole, criminal justice system stakeholders, and the general public about the availability, use, and benefits of reentry facilities and programs;
- (13) Ensure adequate funding for reentry facilities and programs, and develop or assist with the development of facilities and programs as provided in subdivision of section 29-2252 and subdivision of section 83-1,102;
- (14) Develop standardized definitions of outcome measures for existing community corrections facilities and programs and for reentry facilities and programs;
- (15) Research and evaluate existing community corrections facilities and programs;
- (16) Provide an annual report as provided in section 18 of this act;
- (17) Manage all data acquired in a confidential manner in compliance with section 25 of this act;
- (18) Enter into and administer contracts, if necessary, to carry out the purposes of the Criminal Justice Reentry and Data Act; and perform such other duties as may be necessary to carry out the act.

Each reporting center shall provide, contract for, or utilize a voucher service program for access to mental health services for those on probation. It is the intent of the Legislature to appropriate fifteen million dollars to the Reentry Programming Board Cash Fund. Five million dollars shall be allocated for violence reduction and anger management programming, five million dollars for job training, and five million dollars for housing. Fifty percent of the funds shall be expended for programming under the Department of Correctional Services and fifty percent for community-based programs approved by the Reentry Programming Board.
