# Survey Overview Survey Purpose & Approach

On May 4, 2020 the 201 academic law libraries in the United States were sent an invitation via the ALL-SIS and NELLCO list-servs to participate in a brief, online survey. The 23-item survey asked libraries about the implications of the COVID-19 pandemic on their library and staff and what ideas are being considered as they plan to reopen. While the survey was developed and analyzed by NELLCO, NELLCO membership was not a requirement for survey participation or receipt of the results.

The invitation asked that the survey only be completed once per library. A total of 122 academic law libraries (61%) answered at least one question on the survey. Of the 122 participants who started the survey, 100 (82%) completed the survey.

Please note, not all responses presented in this report total 100%. This may occur due to rounding or the ability for participants to select multiple responses on some questions.

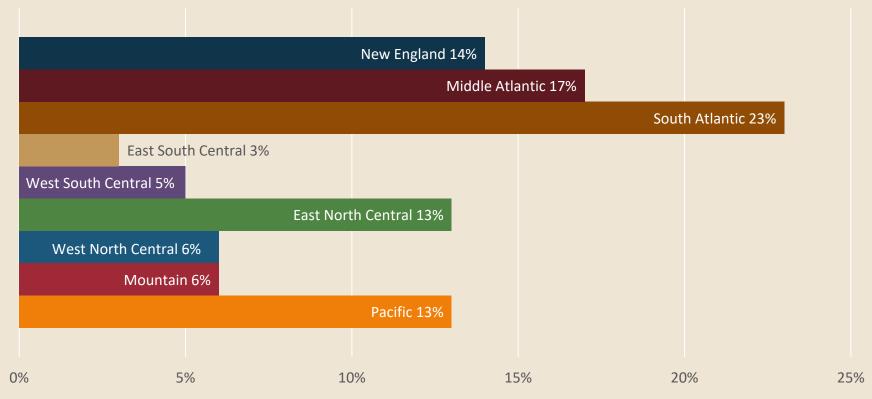

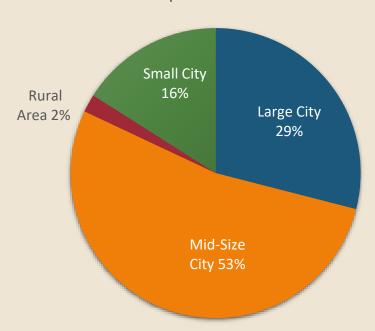

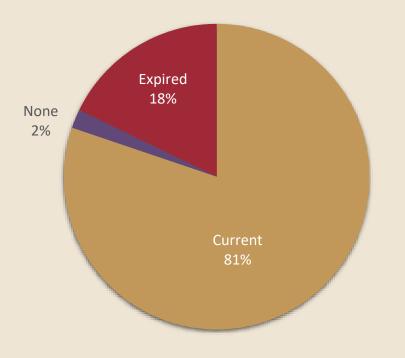

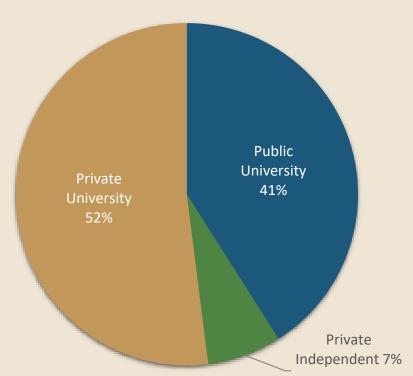

Law School Affiliation & FTE

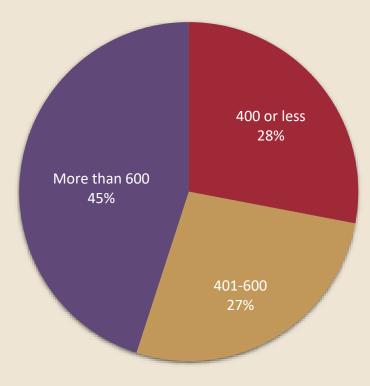

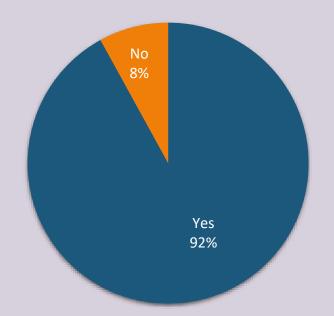

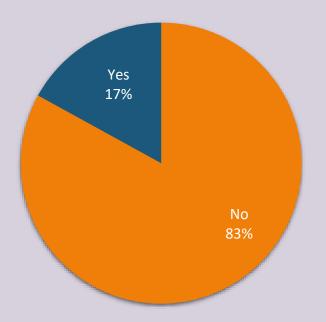
#### Summer & Fall 2020 Courses

Official Decision Made on Holding Fall 2020 Courses Responded: 121

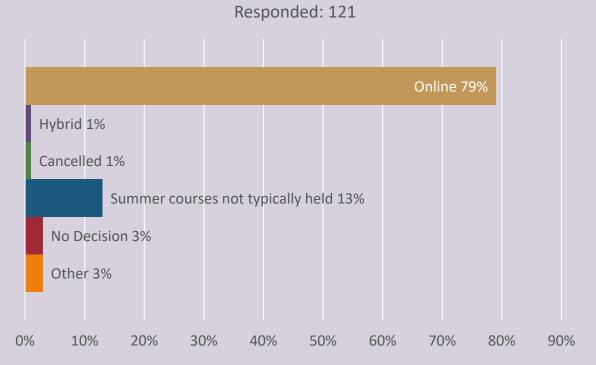




#### Summer 2020 Courses

Key takeaways from the respondents' "Other" comments include:

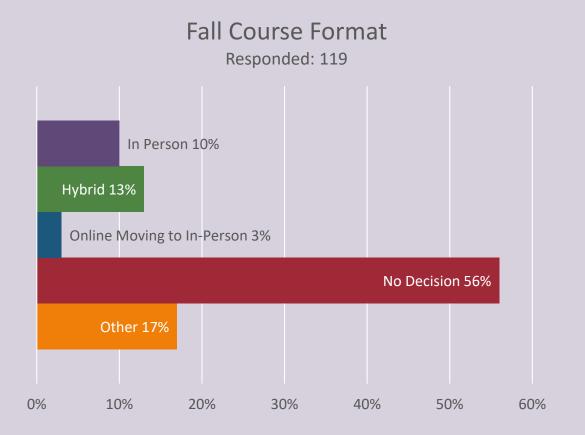
- Considering face-to-face courses later in the summer
- No final decision has been made, but considering in-person "experimental offerings"
- Despite not traditionally offering summer JD courses, the law school developed online summer courses to support students impacted by the evolving job market

#### Fall 2020 Courses

Most schools have not yet made an official decision on the format for Fall 2020 classes



Options with no responses: Classes will be held online; Classes are cancelled

Key takeaways from respondents' "Other" comments illustrated different options for Fall, including: include:

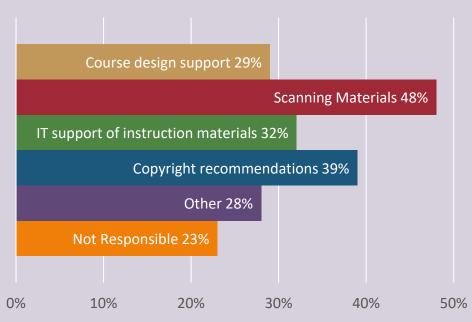
- Hold in-person courses, but online courses are the contingency plan
- Many institutions/law schools are planning for a full range of scenarios
- Some schools are prioritizing holding 1L courses in-person, with upper-level courses hybrids or solely online
- Some plan to hold Fall courses online and move to in-person when possible. In this plan, courses will also continue online for people who cannot/have not returned to campus
- Cancelled fall programs abroad



### Online Instructional Support

Over three-quarters of law libraries are responsible for providing some online instructional support

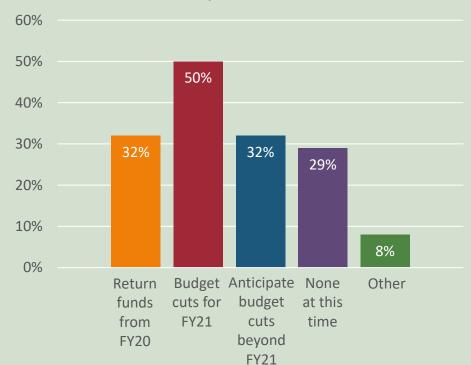


### Financial Implications on Budget

More than two-thirds of libraries reported negative impacts on library budgets

#### Libraries with Budget Changes

Approximately 40% of libraries reported experiencing two or more of these implications.

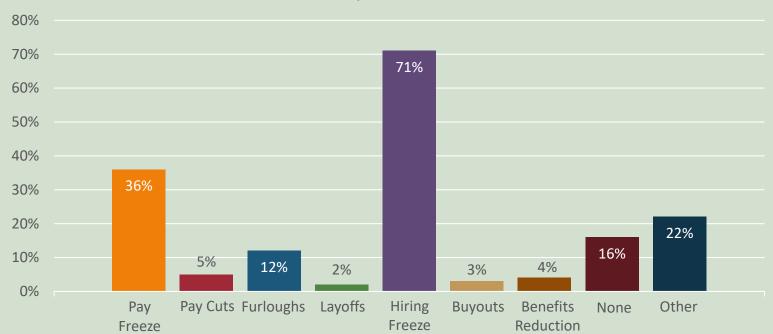

### Financial Implications on Library Staff

Over three-quarters of respondents indicated negative financial implications for library faculty and staff.





Approximately half of participating libraries reported experiencing a combination of two to four financial implications for library faculty and staff.

Key takeaways from respondents' "Other" comments include:

The majority indicated that at least one of these actions are being considered for segments of the staff, but no final decision has been made. Other responses included suspension of merit increases; temporary or voluntary pay cuts; reduced work weeks; and implications focused on part-time or student staff.

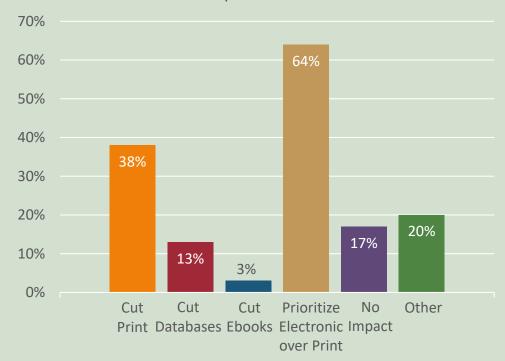


### Financial Implications on Collections

The majority of libraries are focusing funds on electronic purchasing over print resource purchasing

#### **Library Collection Implications**

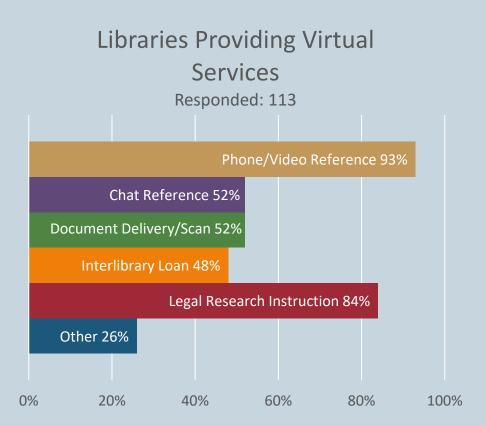

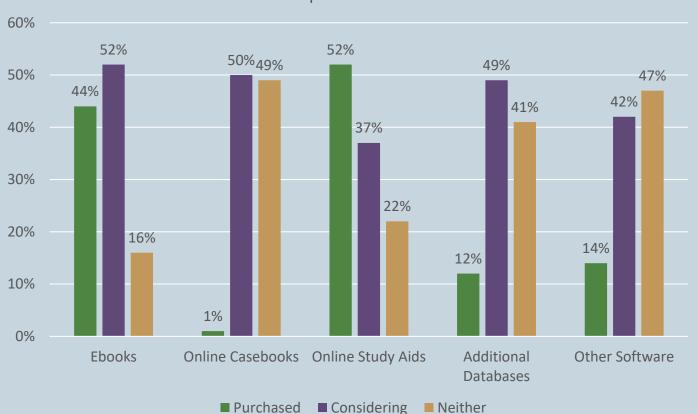

Libraries focused their discussion on study aid packages. Discussion of partnering with an institution's main library and publishers to expand access to databases and casebooks for free also occurred.

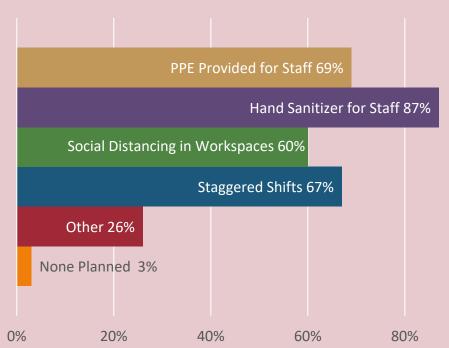

### Staff Safety Enhancements

97% of responding libraries plan to implement staff health and safety enhancements

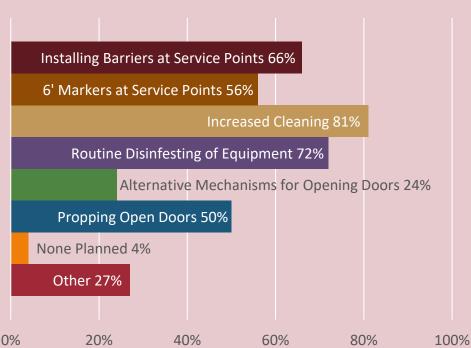

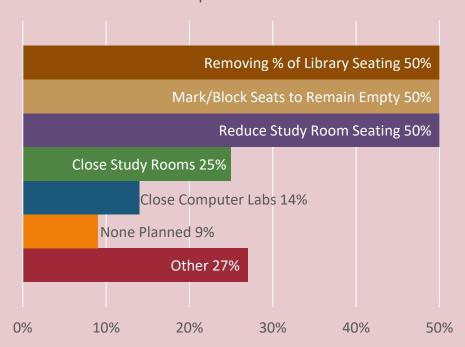


### Patron Space Safety Alterations

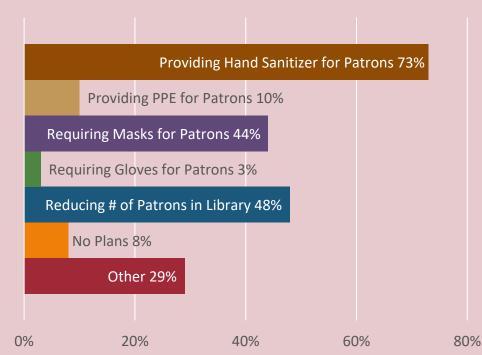

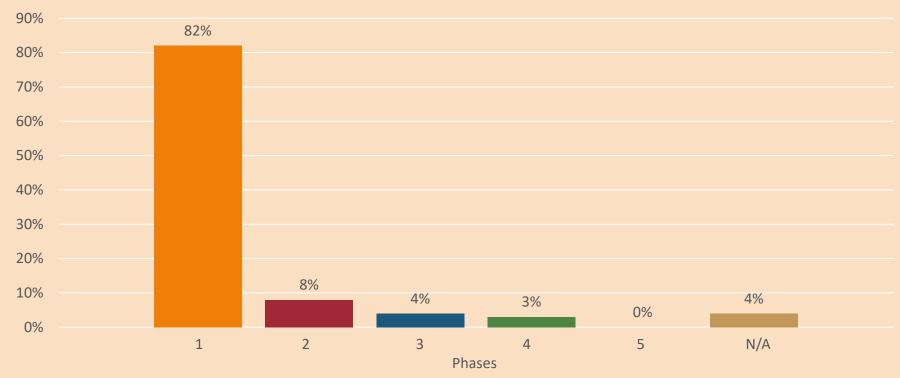

82% of responding libraries' staff will return to the library in Phase One of the reopening plan

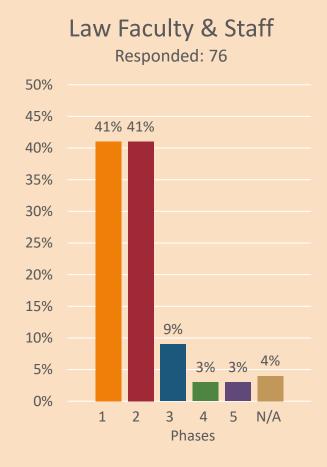

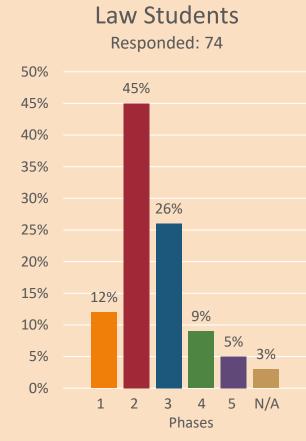

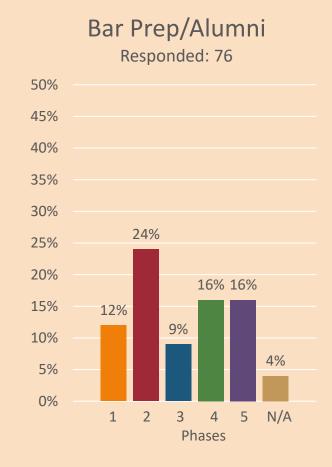


### Phased Reopening to Patron Groups

92% of responding libraries plan to reopen in phases rather than all at once

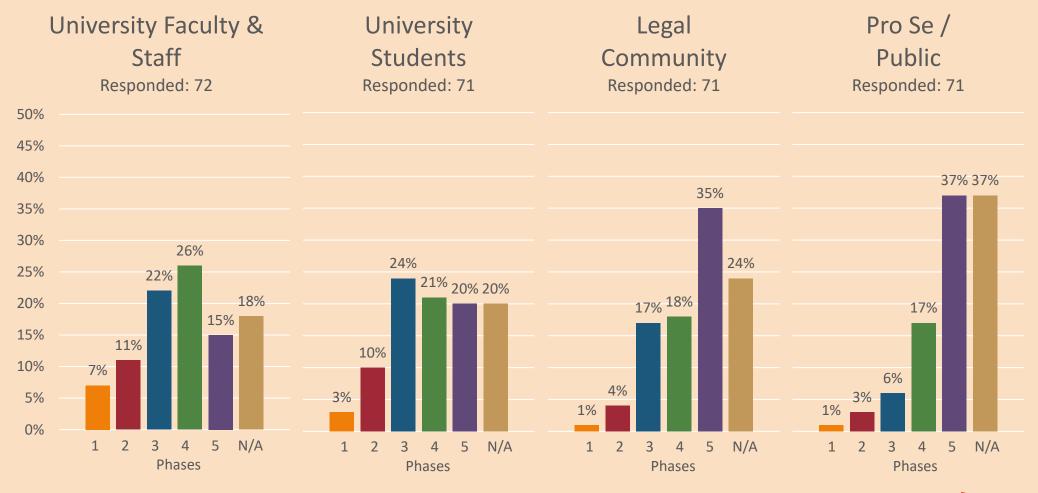






### Phased Reopening to Patron Groups
