Why did you decide to go into the field of water?

I love the water and can't remember a time when I wasn't swimming in the ocean or a pool. Growing up at north end of the Jersey Shore, I witnessed the impacts of ocean dumping and it left a strong impression on me. In elementary school, I had a project on the environment and Sandy Hook. This project foreshadowed my career – there are pages of my report dedicated to wastewater effluent and building sanitation plants! As an ocean swimmer and a lifeguard on the Raritan Bay, my love for water and its impact on our lives has always been important to me.

My internship and first job out of college was in wastewater but I was quickly drawn to drinking water. I had the opportunity to work on groundwater pilot studies and storage tank projects. I moved to New York City and was part of the design team for two very large water treatment facilities – the Croton Water Filtration Plant and the Catskill/Delaware Ultraviolet Disinfection Facility. Fortunately, I was able to get back to working on great projects in New Jersey like the East Orange Water Supply and Treatment Program and the Oak Glen Water Treatment Plant. Throughout my career, I've worked on different pieces of the drinking water process – wells, aqueducts, treatment plants and distribution systems. I'm passionate about discussing drinking water with my friends, family and the public in a way that is factual and easy to understand.

How did you become a volunteer for AWWA? What motivates you to be active in the Section?

Young Professionals bowling nights were my first introduction to AWWA! In my early years in AWWA NJ, I was active with the Young Professionals and Water for People committees. A mentor of mine encouraged me to join the Technical Program Committee.
