Accident Will Happen!

 Policies need to understand that there are many variables when dealing with children, teachers and parents.

 An accident is not a serious risk, systematic and repetitive serious risks are not an accident and

should be dealt with differently than accidents.

 Note accidents do not remove responsibility from providers. What are the odds?

100 Child Center Operates 250 Days per Year

25,000 Child Days/yr

Odds of an Accident?

Continuous Improvement Not Punishment

 Corrective action, standard operating procedures and continuous improvement should be the first steps in mitigating future serious risks after an accident has happen.

 Ignoring, sidestepping or manipulating the above risk mitigating tactics need to be dealt with through tougher enforcement systems such as fines, sanctions, license removal, etc...



The Same System

 All types of providers ODE, ODJFS, Centers, rated, non-rated, Type A & B and others, should have the <u>same</u> systems of serious risk prevention policies, enforcement and consequences.

 Currently financial penalties only apply to rated centers, other than license or contract removal.

Separate Quality Standards from Penalties

 Step Up to Quality ratings and benefits need to be separated from Serious Risk Policies.

 Serious risk policies should apply uniformly across all types and settings.

Your Day in Court

- When a provider is facing revocation or suspension of star ratings, they should have a fair and impartial process.
