APA Ethics and Guidelines:

(Note-In the Regulations governing the practice of psychology in Pennsylvania, we are REQUIRED to act in accord with American Psychological Association standards and Guidelines related to practice and to the conduct of research with human beings and animals.)

Principle 3e from the Pennsylvania Regulations Ethical Principles:

(e) As practitioners and researchers, psychologists act in accord with American Psychological Association standards and guidelines related to practice and to the conduct of research with human beings and animals. In the ordinary course of events, psychologists adhere to relevant governmental laws and institutional regulations. Whenever the laws, regulations or standards are in conflict, psychologists make known their commitment to a resolution of the conflict. Both practitioners and researchers are concerned with the development of laws and regulations which best serve the public interest.

The Grossman Decision:

The Grossman decision is very important in Pennsylvania. It affirmed that when there is shared or joint legal custody of a child under age 14, there must be consent from both parents (or a Court Order) in order to evaluate that child. Although Dr. Grossman was hired to conduct a review of a custody evaluation conducted by someone else, he met with a child without consent from both parents.
