YEAR IN REVIEW

2009 marked a year of rising demand for Access Now's specialty health care services as the Great Recession rocked the Richmond area. Thousands of lost jobs wiped out health benefits for employees across all sectors of the economy, tearing the fabric of the area's healthcare safety net.

Access Now was created by the Richmond Academy of Medicine in 2007 at the request of 11 area clinics and public health departments who could meet the primary care needs of their patients but did not have the resources to provide comprehensive, complex care. The Academy houses the program – which is recognized as Virginia's first virtual specialty care free clinic – and helps guide it with executive and board leadership. Furthermore, Richmond Academy of Medicine members comprise the vast majority of participating volunteer physicians.

Access Now, which assisted 1,175 people in its first year of operation in 2008, saw a dramatic 40 percent increase of patients who enrolled in 2009. The 1,646 people served this year were referred for specialty health care from the region's 18 free clinics, public health departments, and federally-qualified health centers.

Though we couldn't mend every tear in the safety net, we worked hard to help everyone who qualified for services. That is, anyone who has no medical insurance and whose household income is at, or below, 200 percent of federal poverty guidelines and needs access to complex medical care. Our mission is to serve this population and to ensure that no patient goes without care for want of a willing provider.

As demand rose, our volunteer physicians and mid-level practitioners – who numbered 895 by year's end – met the challenge head on. Their generosity and passion for service helped us fulfill our mission of *providing the right care, at the right time, in the most economical setting*. Today, Access Now stands ready to expand our physician network, which provides specialists in more than 45 areas of medical practice. Our volunteer physician network grew by 25 percent in 2009 – a volunteer network that is among the largest in the nation. Our volunteer doctors see patients, provide consultation, treatment, and follow-up. If surgery is required, surgeons operate in area hospitals or in private ambulatory surgical centers.

Even as other parts of the state and nation struggled this year to serve millions of uninsured Americans, Access Now adapted to address the mounting need for specialty health care in Central Virginia. This year alone we enrolled 1,646 new patients and coordinated clinical services valued at \$3.2 million. This was accomplished with operating expenses that were less than 10 percent of our total budget.

As a result, for every \$1 invested in Access Now, the program returned \$11.46 worth of medical services back to the community, a solid return on investment that helped raise the overall quality of health – and life – in the Richmond region.

Without Access Now, a young entrepreneur in Richmond, Carly Herring, may have been left incapacitated by rheumatoid arthritis. At age 25, she could barely walk, much less work as a restaurant chef after her hands and legs became painful and swollen. After a referral from Fan Free Clinic, she saw Access Now volunteer physician Dr. James Sutherland, MD, at Arthritis Specialists who "got me on track with medication and came up with an attack plan" to treat her arthritis. Within a week, she stopped limping and was able to move on with her busy life - including opening a new restaurant. Without Dr. Sutherland's effective care and the combined work of the Fan Free Clinic and Access Now, Herring says, "At 25, my



CEO Statement from 2009 Report to Community Foundation

Richmond is fortunate to have clinics that provide primary care for residents who live at or below the federal poverty level and have no health insurance. But have you ever wondered where these clinics send patients whose needs exceed their scope? Where a tree climber from Powhatan with torn cartilage receives therapy? Where a caretaker from Henrico goes once the clinic finds her tumor? Where the Goochland father with herniated discs finds relief?

Until three years ago, most clinics simply told patients to go to an area emergency department because limited specialty care was available. It was sadly the only recourse left. Emergency care is not only the most expensive medical care, it is not the right care for non-urgent needs, including disease management.


Today, safety net clinics turn to Access Now – a volunteer driven specialty care network of more than 850 physicians who provide complex care. Patients receive the right care, at the right time and in the most economical and appropriate setting – a specialty physician's office. That's better care, more appropriate care and less expensive care for patients.

Patients aren't the only winners. Local hospitals win when free care is provided in community settings; clinics win when complex care is available for their patients; and our community wins when the uninsured poor receive quality care by specialists.

Before Access Now, "It could take a day calling around on the phone. There was no organizational structure. There was no system ... Now it's really like a health plan." Shaia recalls a woman with a bad case of arthritis who needed both hips to be replaced. But she couldn't afford health insurance. Yet, even after Shaia offered to perform the surgery at no charge, she declined the offer. "She never came back. I didn't see her for years." When she did return, the woman's arthritis had worsened, but her entire mood had changed. For some reason, she was willing to consider hip replacement surgery. "She said, 'I have insurance. I have Access Now.'" The orthopedic surgeon observes, "She didn't really have insurance, but she felt like she did. With Access Now, she had both hips replaced. For her, somehow, it was more acceptable, as opposed to taking free treatment."

Elizabeth Oloo Access Now "screened me and asked some questions. Then they called back and said we're sending you a card that will help you with medical attention from the doctors we assign." Oloo, who had breast cancer, was even more astounded to read on her Access Now card that she wouldn't have to pay a cent for the care for the treatment. "I was amazed! I thought it was a miracle."




Otis Pierce was slowed down by precancerous polyps. After they were removed, he says, "I'm a strong man. I've been feeling like I hope to keep going."



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
