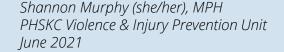

PHSKC VIOLENCE & INJURY PREVENTION (VIP) UNIT

- Plan, implement, and evaluate approaches that reduce injury and violent deaths in King County
- Focus on averting critical yet entirely preventable health issues
 - Intentional: suicide, gun violence, domestic violence
 - Unintentional: drowning, bicycle / head injuries, motor vehicle crashes, traffic and pedestrian safety
- Adapting during Covid-19 pandemic
- Shift away from "accidents" towards prediction and prevention

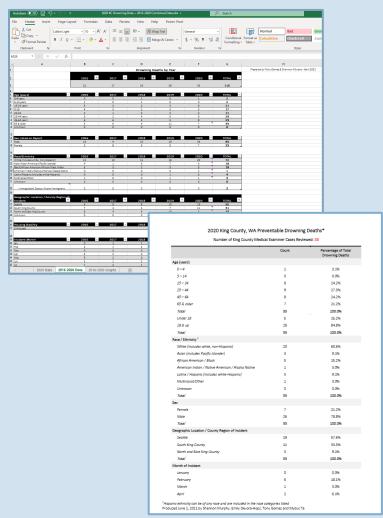

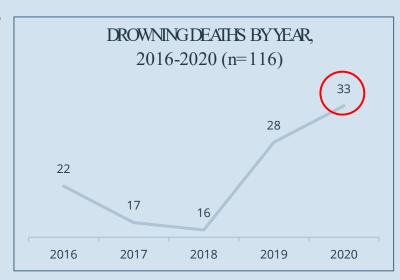

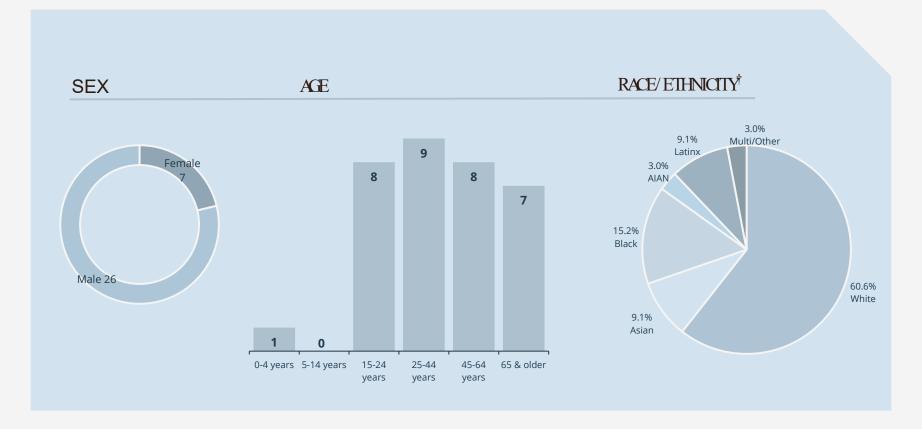
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2016 - 2020 PREVENTABLE DROWNING DEATHS

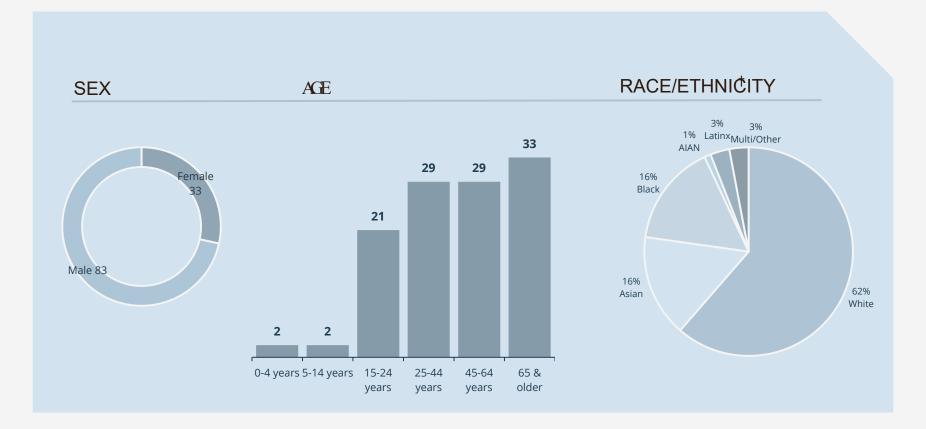
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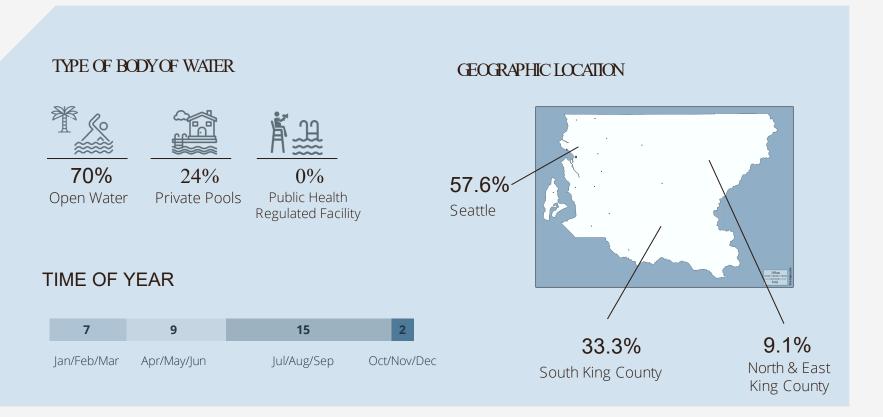
2020 DROWNING DEMOGRAPHIC DATA



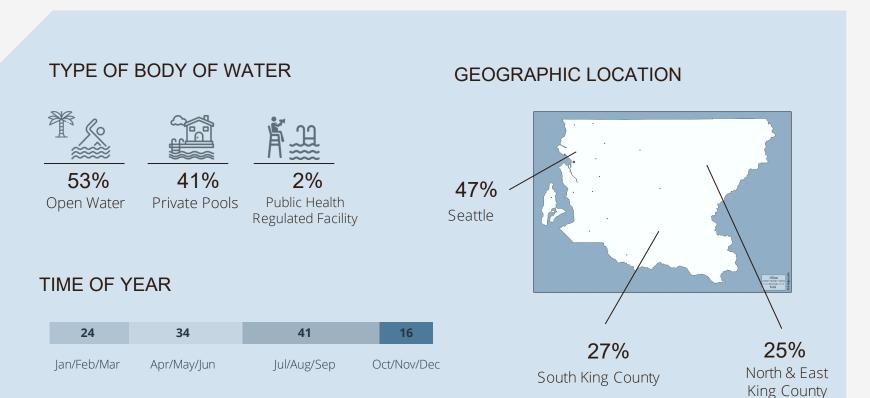
2016-2020 DROWNING DEMOGRAPHIC DATA

Every year, there is preventable tragedy on the water. In King County, 33 people died in preventable drownings in 2020. Up from 28 in 2019 and twice as many as the 16 deaths in 2018! Over half of victims had alcohol, drugs or both as factors.

Key Messages

With Covid restrictions loosening and warm weather here early season drowning prevention is critical! Drowning is a preventable tragedy and an important public health and public safety issue. Warm weather draws people to pools, lakes, rivers and salt-water areas, creating potentially high risk situations for themselves, others and rescuers. Swimmers, waders, boaters and other water recreationists should follow these recommendations to prevent drownings:

Know the risks -- Washington waters are often cold enough to cause muscles to not work, cause cold water shock, even on the hottest summer day. Cold water can quickly weaken even the strongest swimmer.

- King County rivers for most of the season are extremely cold, fast moving and dangerous. Snow pack.

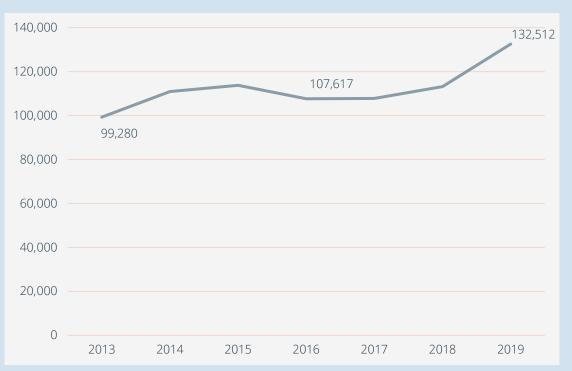
- . In 2017, there were 4,508 drowning deaths in the United States, an average of 12 deaths per day, CDC WISOARS Injury Mortality Report, accessed June 2019
- In Washington, there were 98 unintentional drowning fire/burns, were the second leading cause of unintentional injury death for children and teens ages
- WA Department of Health, Washington Tracking Network Data accessed June 2019 . In King County, 16 people died in preventable

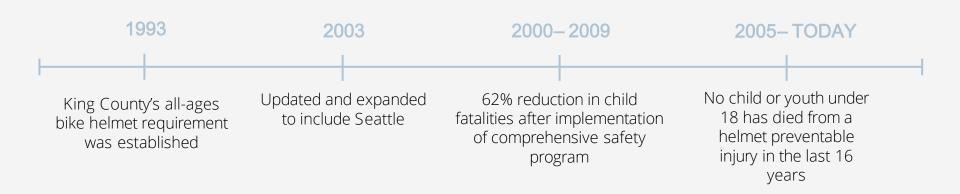
SEATTLE BIKE RIDERSHIP
