

Professional Ethics

- First, a profession is a group of workers, such as doctors, lawyers, or safety professionals, with a higher degree of specialisation, qualification, or certification and a more significant duty of care to the public.
- Second, these experts establish moral guidelines that other professionals must adhere to (Bradbury, 2024).

Code of Conduct & Ethics

Codes are written from rule-based, prohibitive, and aspirational ethics.

• It is not as easy as black and white to apply.



Navigating Ethical Dilemmas

Case Study 1: Confidentiality vs. Public Safety

• Engineer James inspects a building for a client before selling it. He discovers structural defects that could pose a public safety threat. James recommends evacuation and repair, but the client refuses, fearing legal action and losing business.

• They claim the information is theirs and should not be shared without their permission (Harris et al.,2019).





Case Study 2: Reporting vs. Under-Reporting

- Tom, a Safety Professional, was instructed by his manager to report and classify an injury as a medical treatment case.
- Tom was on duty when an employee fell from a height of about 4 meters. Tom escorted the employee to the 'special' medical practitioner as per protocol.
- The medical practitioner assigned the injury as light duty, even though the employee had suffered a fractured shoulder.
- Tom observed the worker in pain at work; however, under pressure to underreport.

Case Study 3: Accepting Gifts vs. Bribery

- Matt, an engineer in a construction firm, is tasked with recommending ACME steel studs for a large apartment building. After thorough research and testing, he decides to use ACME steel studs.
- An ACME representative visits him and offers him a voucher for an all-expensepaid trip to the annual ACME Technical Forum in Jamaica (Harris et al., 2019).


