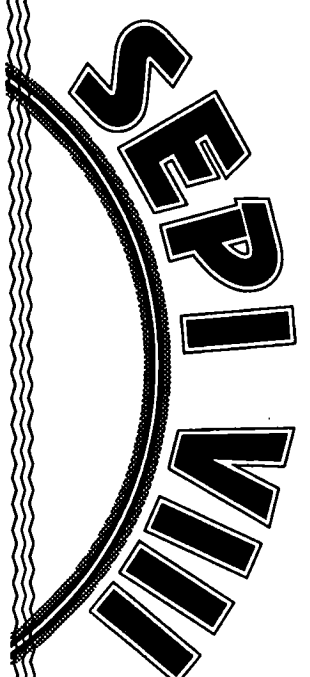

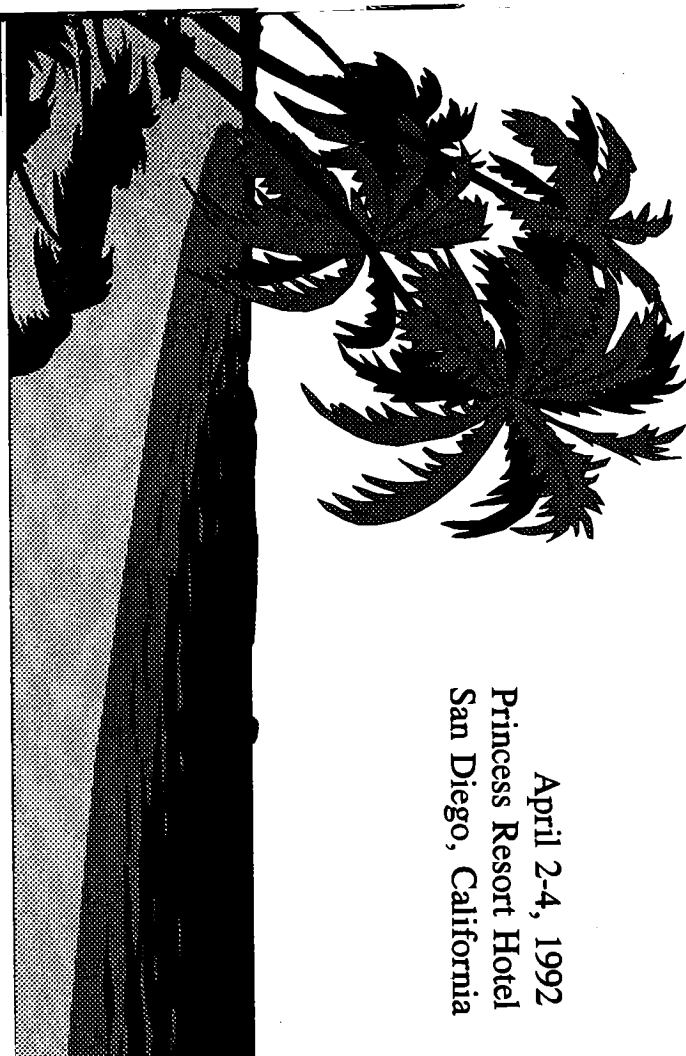

The Society for the Exploration of Psychotherapy Integration (SEPI) announces its eighth annual meeting, to be held at the Princess Resort Hotel in San Diego, California, Thursday, April 2 through Saturday, April 4, 1992.

SEPI is an organization that arose out of a growing interest among psychotherapists, theoreticians, and researchers, in crossing the boundaries that separate traditional schools of psychotherapy, to combine and integrate theoretical ideas, utilize techniques and strategies from different approaches, and identify underlying common factors.

SEPI VIII will bring together many of the most active clinicians, educators, and researchers in this field to share their latest thinking. The conference is for mental health professionals of all persuasions who are interested in integrative psychotherapy from the perspectives of theory, practice, and research.

Creative integration and dialogue depend on a diversity of perspectives and ideas. The theme of SEPI VIII, "Integration and Diversity," has been chosen to reflect this. The conference will consist of individual presentations, workshops, symposia, and discussion groups. An outstanding program has been put together. It is jam-packed with presentations on clinical applications, theoretical issues, and research aspects.

Registration Information

The conference will take place at the Princess Resort Hotel, a luxury hotel located on an island in Mission Bay. Guest rooms are bungalow style, each with its own patio and a view of either a lagoon, a garden, or Mission Bay (bay view rooms cost a bit more). The Princess has spacious grounds, five swimming pools, a spa, its own beach, a private marina where guests can rent power, sailing, or paddle boats, tennis courts, bicycle paths and bicycle rentals, volleyball courts, a 1.3 mile running course, and a parcourse. It is near downtown San Diego, and the picturesque seaside village of La Jolla, and Tijuana, Mexico is not far away. SEPI has negotiated a guest room rate, which is a significant reduction from the regular room rate.

Due to limitations on the number of hotel rooms and meeting space available, registration for the conference is limited to 350. With the increasing interest in SEPI, those planning to attend are urged to register early and to secure a confirmed hotel reservation.

The registration fee includes the cost of one breakfast, one lunch, and one dinner session. It covers all other sessions, materials, and coffee breaks. We particularly want to call your attention to the Saturday Morning breakfast sessions, which allow informal interaction on a number of interesting topics over breakfast.

Discount Airfares/Ground Transport

Conference participants flying to the program may obtain discount airfare through American Airlines by calling 1-800-433-1790 and asking for STAR File #S103272. American will offer 40% off full fare day coach purchased 7 days in advance to SEPI registrants originating in the contiguous 48 states, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. Passengers originating in Canada will be offered 35% off full fare coach purchased 7 days in advance. In lieu of the above, any passenger may get 5% off any promotional fare for which they qualify. Ground transportation from the airport to the Princess Hotel can be arranged in the Baggage Claim area of the San Diego International Airport by calling Super Shuttle. There is a five dollar fee for the shuttle service.

PROGRAM

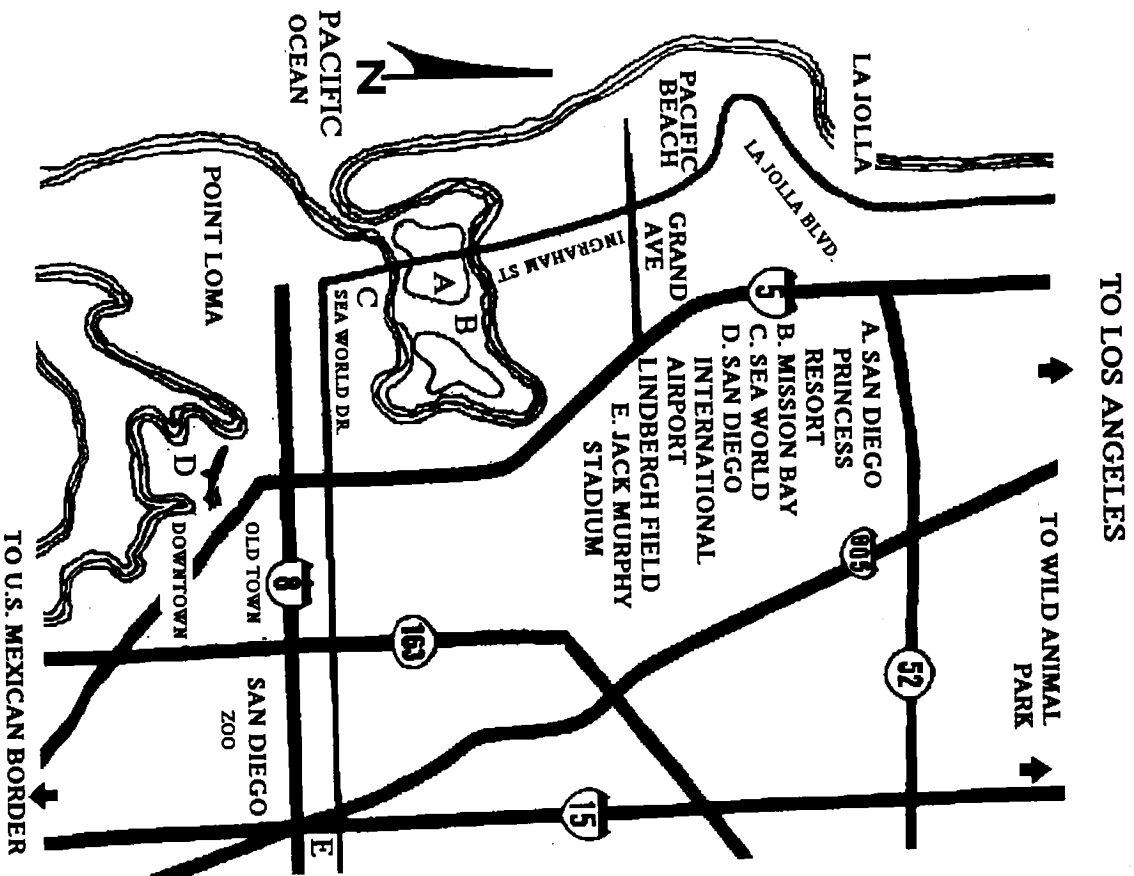
