### **Against classism? For discussion. — Ballroom E**

Leaders: Patricia Jimenez and the UUMA Committee on Ministry

The UUMA's Committee on Ministry for Anti-racism, Anti-oppression, and Multiculturalism is aware of some of the ways that economic disparities and classism affect our body of colleagues; from inability to pay dues and attend collegial gatherings because of financial constraints, to some of our assumptions about what it means to be a member of the UUMA, to differences due to the kind of ministry we do, and where we do it. The committee invites you to join us for a conversation about economic justice and classism and what it means to us as colleagues.

### **Changing Categories to Specialties — a Collegial Conversation—Pacific**

### **Partner Church and the UU Holdeen India Program—Seaview A**

Leaders: Olivia Holmes, John Gibbons, David Keyes, Kathy Sreedhar

The Partner Church Council and UUA Office of International Relations have been doing some exciting exploratory work with our UU Holdeen India Program partners about the possibility of forming partnerships in human rights work.

Our Holdeen India Partners work in the human rights arena in India, often risking their lives to defend the rights and needs of "untouchable" people and tribal people, women and children, all of whom are among the poorest of the poor. Kathy Sreedhar has been the Executive Director of our UUHIP program for the past 20 years, and over that time has supported and advised and networked tirelessly, including creating advocacy programs here in the US to help our partners learn more in their specific fields.

These partnerships may be very different from existing church-to-church partnerships in Transylvania, India, and the Philippines, all of which are with Unitarian congregations. They could, for example, mean creating partnerships with UUs in congregations doing similar types of work in the US, or with people across UU congregations in the US (and Canada?) who have particular skills to share with our partners in India. We believe that a next step might be having a "collegial conversation" with interested ministers to see what ideas they might have about how such partnerships could work within or across congregations...

### **Polyamory— Beacon A**

Leaders: Lyn Cox, Kendyl Gibbons, and Bob Schaibly

As members of our congregations as well as some of our colleagues become more open about their diverse family structures, and as we come face to face with the varying practices in different cultures, we are once again challenged to wrestle with our social expectations and our moral principles around the intimate issues of marriage, sexuality, and covenant commitment. Is it possible for adults to be in loving, committed relationships with more than one person at a time? If possible, is it healthy? Can we as ministers bless such relationships? How shall we urge our congregations to respond to them? What would we need to know in order to begin to answer these kinds of questions? This is a conversation that will necessarily unfold over time, but if it is not to begin in crisis, it should be started now. We will share insights and concerns, without attempting to arrive at definitive answers.


### **Same-Sex Marriage Media Training by GLAAD — Ballroom A, B & C**



(Fourth Floor)**




**LOWER LEVEL
