

Anna M. Dailey is a Partner with the national law firm of Dinsmore & Shohl and has been practicing law for 40 years. Her expertise is in both traditional labor law and employment law, representing a variety of industries, including energy, manufacturing, and health care. In addition to her legal practice, Anna also serves on the West Virginia Chamber of Commerce's Board of Directors; its Executive Committee and chairs the Chamber's Civil Justice Committee and is a member of the WV Industrial Council. Anna's past roles have included: a) 6 years on Dinsmore's Board of Directors & its Executive Committee; b) Charleston Office Managing Partner for Dinsmore; c) Chair of the WV Chamber's Human Resources Committee; d) Chair of Leadership WV Board of Directors; d) Trustee of Eastern Mineral Law Foundation. and e) Kanawha County Parks Commissioner for 12 years, where she served as its president for 6 years.

In 2002, Dailey was appointed by the 3 Kanawha County Commissioners to the Kanawha County Parks & Recreation Commission where she served for almost 12 years. For more than 6 of those years Dailey was the elected president of the Parks Commission until she resigned to take on more leadership responsibilities at Dinsmore in 2012. The Kanawha County Parks system consists of seven parks with 2500 acres, with both highly developed areas and densely forested areas. Facilities include two golf courses, two pools, a variety of recreational activities, shelter rentals and meeting/reception room rentals. The majority of funding for the Parks comes from tax monies allocated to it by the Kanawha County Commission and fees charged for the use of some of the Park's facilities. While President, Dailey led a controversial effort to sell a golf course facility located mostly in a different county, started the Coonskin Park Foundation that raised over \$1 million dollars of in-kind and cash donations to build a driving range and negotiated a cooperative services agreement with a local university.

In 2019, Dailey was appointed by West Virginia's governor, and confirmed by the WV Senate, to serve on the WV Industrial Council. In consultation with the WV Insurance Commissioner, the Industrial Council is charged with establishing guidelines and policies designed to ensure the effective administration of the workers' compensation insurance market in West Virginia. Of the 5 voting members, Dailey was appointed to fill the legislative requirement for an attorney with financial management experience.
