Annual Meeting Online CE Platform and Presentation Materials

The WSPA uses an online CE platform, Lecture Panda (LP) for the WSPA Annual Meeting. Meeting participants can use LP for each session to access full accreditation information, download and view presentation slides and handouts, claim CE credit, and evaluate sessions.

Your profile is unique to each WSPA meeting, so you will need to create your new profile for the Annual Meeting. The LecturePanda registration link will be sent to you via email a few days prior to the meeting and will come from askwspa@wsparx.org or charlene@wsparx.org. As always, your NABP# and date of birth is required for pharmacists and technicians to register and claim CE credit. Once you create your profile, you will receive an email from "LecturePanda". Please keep this email as this will be how you access your profile again. The email contains a link to view CE session objectives and full accreditation information, upload CE credit and download presentation materials. Presentation slides and handouts can be accessed through the "Materials" section in LP. Use this tab to download and print presentations before the meeting. Printed handouts or presentations will not be provided at the meeting. Also, the CE sessions will have Wi-Fi available so you may bring a laptop, phone or tablet to log your CEs and take notes.

CE Requirement – Secret Codes and Online Evaluation

In order to receive credit, participants must go into LP to submit the secret codes and evaluation for each CE activity attended. At the end of each CE presentation, participants will be provided with a secret code. Participants can document the code on the Activity Description and CE Tracking Form available at the registration desk. To receive credit for the activity, participants must follow the **LP Registration and Upload Instructions** provided on the website and at the meeting. WSPA staff will be available throughout the meeting to assist you with the CE upload. Participants will only have **60 days** from the activity date to upload CE credits in order to receive credit. This talk will guide you through some of the newer antidote data including use of high dose n-acetylcysteine, when you should and shouldn't use high-dose insulin for a calcium channel blocker, adding fomepizole for an acetaminophen overdose, or maybe just giving a little dose of digoxin immune fab.

The July 2023 FDA approval of the first-ever over the counter birth control pill presents a momentous opportunity for reengaging around how we, as health care professionals, support client's interests to manage pregnancy. Although a progestin-only pill has been a longstanding method to prevent pregnancy, the opportunity to access it without a prescription allows for the health care field to attune access to client's current needs. This presentation will cover relevant family planning policy, what Medicaid clients are eligible for, and available resources provided by the Health Care Authority to support pharmacies' critical role in contraception access.
